THE APPLICATION PROCESS

Obtaining prospectus and application forms

Application forms can be accessed on-line through the College website on <http://home.cmcvellore.ac.in> and submitted with a basic administrative fee of Rs 500/-. Application forms are available by post from the Office of the Registrar on payment of Rs.500/-. Applications are also available at all head post-offices in Tamil Nadu, Pondicherry and Kerala, and selected Head post offices elsewhere in the country (check Annexure V for detailed instructions)

Pay as indicated below and **send the DD, the Chalan or receipt to:** The Office of the Registrar, CMC, Thorapadi PO, Vellore 632002. *State your full postal address with Pin-code. Mention your telephone number and email address if available.* No additional money, stamps or envelopes are required.

Candidates applying from abroad (including SAARC countries) please see section on Foreign Nationals and Residents.

Medical University Chennai where the minimum qualification prescribed is an equivalent to 10+2 Higher Secondary Examination after a period of 12 years of study, the last two years of study comprising of Physics, Chemistry and Biology with English.

ALL STUDENTS ARE EXPECTED TO SERVE FOR A PERIOD OF TWO YEARS, IN AN AREA OF NEED, AFTER THE COMPLETION OF THEIR COURSE. PLEASE SEE DETAILS.

BEFORE SENDING FILLED FORMS

1. It is the responsibility of the candidate to read these instructions and to ensure completeness of the Application forms. **An incomplete form or an application filled in a language other than English will be summarily rejected.**
2. Completed application forms along with relevant enclosures and Registration fees as detailed below should reach the Office of the Registrar not later than the last date specified, **even if qualifying examination results are not available by that date**
3. *Please note that a separate 'Registration Fee' for each course will have to be paid when the filled application is sent for registration. This is the same for both on-line and paper applications. When applying on-line, the application administrative fee of Rs 500 will also be included. (A fee of Rs 500 has already been charged when getting the paper forms). The procedure for all payments can only be one of those mentioned on page 1.*
4. Registration Fees: The following registration fees must be enclosed with the completed application form.
Group A courses:
MBBS, BPT, BOT, BSc (Nursing) and BSc-MLT - Rs 400 **per course**
Group B courses:
BMRSc, PGDCPC, Dip Nursing and other Group B courses - Rs 100 **per course**
(Foreign nationals and applicants from abroad please see section specific to them).
The total fees applicable may be paid as one draft or chalan as detailed earlier. **The following details should be written on the back of the Bank Draft/chalan:**
 - i. Application Number
 - ii. Name of the Candidate
5. The procedure for payment is indicated on page 1. For those applying online, the registration fee is in addition to an application admin fee of Rs. 500. Please write the candidate's name and application number on the back of the DD/chalan.
6. *Please note the application number on your forms. Quote this for any enquiry that you may have and when communicating in all further correspondence with the Registrar's Office.*
7. When applying for more than one course: Candidates must list the courses in the order of preference in the application form. Use course codes as on pages 2-6 of this bulletin
8. Photograph: **A colour passport size photograph taken after 1st February this year** should accompany each application. The photograph should show the face in full. Paste the photographs in the space provided on the Application form. **Please do not staple or pin the photograph**
9. Other enclosures: Where applicable, enclose:
 - a. Copy of (not original) Community/caste certificate, duly signed by Dy Tahsildar or District Magistrate.[Enclosures may be sent separately provided the Application number is clearly mentioned. Enclosures received without this number or after the last date will not be accepted. Academic or extra curricular certificates should not be enclosed]



10. For those applying on paper - Please include the following:

- a. **Acknowledgement card** with the candidate's address and Rs.6 postal stamp affixed.
After preliminary scrutiny, the acknowledgement card will be returned to the candidate. Please check the card to see if any mention of deficiencies in the application was recorded.
- b. **Window envelope** with **Rs.5** postal stamp affixed.
- c. **A small envelope** with the candidate's address written and Rs. 5 stamp affixed.
Please modify these postage stamps values if the Postal authorities change these.

ELIGIBILITY

The following qualifications are considered equivalent to the Plus Two Examination of the Higher Secondary Board of Tamil Nadu for the purpose of admission. (Subject to Eligibility Certificate issued by the Tamil Nadu Dr. M.G.R. Medical University, Chennai, where applicable).

- ◆ Intermediate examination, Pre-Degree Examination or Plus Two Examination of any recognised Indian University or State Board.
- ◆ The Senior Higher School Certificate Examination (12 years) conducted by the Central Board of Secondary Education, New Delhi, (examination held in 1979 or thereafter with not less than 5 subjects, of which English shall be one).
- ◆ The Indian School Certificate Examination (12 years) conducted by the council for Indian School Examination (held in 1977 or thereafter).
- ◆ Intermediate Examination (two year course) conducted by the Board of Intermediate Education, Hyderabad, Andhra Pradesh.
- ◆ Pre-University Examination (two year course) conducted by the Board of Pre-University Education, Government of Karnataka.

For candidates who have studied abroad, the equivalency of qualification as determined by the Association of Indian Universities will form the guidelines to determine the eligibility. Please note that these are only guidelines and candidates who have qualified overseas must get in touch with the Tamil Nadu Dr MGR Medical University (see website for details).

For courses where Graduation or Diploma is required, the guideline would be recognition by the registering University or affiliating body or by the Govt. of Tamil Nadu.

Whereas those who are doing their examinations may apply, the responsibility is on the candidate that mark-sheets and pass certificates must be available by the time of the interviews.

Those already employed

Candidates currently holding appointments in Government or Private Institutions who seek admission to courses should obtain a NO OBJECTION CERTIFICATE from the employer stating that 'necessary permission has been given to the candidate who will be released for Registration for admission to the (name of course) course in the Christian Medical College'. In case of a delay in getting permission, kindly submit the application form in original to the Registrar's Office within the stipulated date and send in the certificate later with a covering note.

THE SELECTION PROCESS

All candidates whose applications are in order and complete will be registered and go through the competitive process of Entrance Examinations and Interviews for selection. All admissions are based on inter-se merit. The College recognises that merit is not merely academic merit but is, in addition, a collection of various other factors, which go towards suitability to pursue a professional career.



The selection process / admission will be subject to any orders passed or that may be passed by the Government / University / Professional Councils.

THE DECISION OF THE SELECTION COMMITTEE IS FINAL.

HALL TICKETS

Hall Tickets will be available to download from the web site 15 days before the examination. Those applying on paper will also be sent a copy.

Separate hall tickets will be issued for the two groups of courses (A & B).

If a candidate is unable to get the Hall Ticket either by post or from the website, 7 days before their entrance examination, they are advised to **INFORM THE REGISTRAR**, giving full address, the candidate's name, application number, and centre opted for writing the Entrance Test and a fax number if possible, by sending either a fax to 0416 – 2262788/2262268 (giving the above mentioned details and the fax number with STD code for us to send a reply fax) or an e-mail to registrar@cmcvellore.ac.in

A duplicate hall ticket or the hall ticket number and address of the centre will be intimated. Use the Hall ticket number and paste a photograph on a blank sheet of paper, sign it and present it at the examination.

ENTRANCE EXAMINATIONS

There will be examinations for all the courses as detailed below.

GROUPS A & B

Common Degree and Common Diploma Entrance tests:

The entrance examination for the science based Diploma Courses will be on Thursday, 24 May 2007 and for the degree courses on Friday, 25 May 2007 at the following centres:

DEGREE COURSES (Group A)

BENGALURU, CALICUT, CHENNAI, DELHI, ERNAKULAM, GUWAHATI, HYDERABAD, KOLKATA, KOTTAYAM, LUCKNOW, MADURAI, MUMBAI, SALEM, THIRUVANANTHAPURAM, VELLORE, VIJAYAWADA & SINGAPORE

DIPLOMA COURSES (Group B) (excludes Special Papers and the General Paper NS – Courses, 91, 141- 304)

BENGALURU, CHENNAI, DELHI, ERNAKULAM, GUWAHATI, HYDERABAD, KOLKATA, LUCKNOW, MADURAI, MUMBAI, SALEM, THIRUVANANTHAPURAM & VELLORE.

These examinations will consist of multiple-choice questions in Physics, Chemistry, Biology and General Ability with emphasis on Speed and Accuracy and a few questions on issues of current topical interest. The examination will be conducted in ENGLISH. Sample questions are given in Annexure III ("Information on Written Tests"). Performance in this examination will be the basis for being called for the interviews, practical tests and final selections. At the time of the interviews, Christian students who have applied under the sponsored category will be given a test of Bible Knowledge.

GROUP B

Special Paper(s) and the General Paper NS (Courses 91, 141 to 304):

The entrance examination will be held ONLY in Vellore on the dates stipulated. The details about the special paper are mentioned in Annexure III and the Prospectus / website. The General Paper (NS) will consist of questions of a general nature, including very basic science, general knowledge, current awareness and general ability.



INTERVIEWS & PRACTICAL TEST

Interviews & Practical test for selection to the various courses will be held at Vellore according to the schedule on page 1. Candidates who write the All India Entrance in May and are short list for interview & practical test for the Group A degree and B diploma courses will be intimated by letter sent by Speed Post around the second week of June. Hall ticket numbers of these candidates (invited for interviews) will also be posted on the website around 10th June.

The list of candidates selected for interviews & practical test after entrance examinations in Vellore (special paper(s) and General Paper (NS) for the Group B courses will usually be put up on the evening of the day of the entrance examination. Interviews & practical test for those who are called will be held on the date announced. Being called for interview does not necessarily mean selection or acceptance of eligibility.

At the time of registration for interview and practical tests, original certificates should be produced for verification. Attested photocopies are admissible only for the interview BUT NOT for the registration for admission. See web site for details of certificates required.

Announcement of Results

The list of candidates provisionally selected will be put up on notice boards in the College and Town campuses as per the dates in page 1. Candidates can also access their results from the website <http://home.cmcvellore.ac.in>

REGISTRATION FOR ADMISSION OF SELECTED CANDIDATES INTO THE RESPECTIVE COURSES

Selected candidates must report at the time and place specified to register for the respective courses. Failure to complete registration formalities will lead to cancellation of selection and wait listed candidates being registered instead.

WAITING LIST

Two waiting lists will be maintained for each of the courses – Open and Sponsored. If a candidate withdraws from a course, the next candidate on the respective waiting list will fill that seat. However, if there are no more candidates on that particular waitlist, the next candidate from the other list will be invited to join.

WITHDRAWAL FROM ANY COURSE

Students selected and registered for a course, desirous of obtaining their original documents from the Principal for the purpose of attending interviews elsewhere, should deposit a sum of Rs.500 as security. Students who fail to inform their decision to continue or withdraw from the course within two weeks will forfeit their seat as well as the security deposit.

If, after registration, the student withdraws from a course he/she must pay the full annual fees for the said course. Only deposits will be refunded. However, if after registration, the student is offered admission in another course within this institution, the tuition fees alone may be transferred, on request.

FOREIGN NATIONALS & RESIDENTS

All candidates go through the same admission procedure. There is no NRI or Foreign quota. That resident abroad, including SAARC countries will have to pay a different fee for obtaining the Prospectus and also for Registration. This may be sent in INR or equivalent currency payable at Vellore as described earlier. The charges are the same online or on paper.

For candidates who have studied abroad, the equivalency of qualification as determined by the Association of Indian Universities will form the guidelines to determine the eligibility. Please note that these are only guidelines and candidates who have qualified overseas must get in touch with the Tamil Nadu Dr MGR Medical University. Non-Indian nationals may take the preliminary written test and attend interviews. If they are offered a seat in the college, it is the responsibility of the candidate to get necessary clearances and certificates within a stipulated time limit. Details are available on the web site or can be sent if requested.

MERIT LISTS

The College recognises that merit is not merely academic merit but is, in addition other factors, which go towards suitability to pursue a professional career. Selections are based on two broad categories- Open and sponsored. Selection will be based on inter-se merit between these groups

For e.g. in the MBBS course these are further subdivided into groups as follows:

Open: 10 seats where SC/ST reservation of 20% applies, Central Government nominates 1 student and the rest are filled by merit.

In the sponsored group: 50 seats are filled by candidates from the sponsored candidates.

SPONSORSHIP

The aim of the institution is to train individuals for service in needy areas especially in Christian mission hospitals. Christian students are encouraged to apply to be considered under the sponsored category.

Any Christian Church or Organization which is a member of the Christian Medical College Vellore Association or Council which operates its own medical work is eligible to certify candidates for selection to the various educational courses run by CMC, Vellore, provided the organization does not run the said course. In addition the Christian Medical College, Vellore is also a recognized certifying agency.

Christian candidates who are not eligible to be certified by the CMC Vellore Association members may apply to be considered under the sponsored category if

- i. They belong to a Church that is affiliated to the National Council of Churches in India or Evangelical Fellowship of India*
- ii. And registered with the Government.*

Such Candidates should apply to the Council secretary, CMC, Vellore with the following documents

A. A certificate from the pastor of the candidate's church that the candidate has been a member of the church for duration of not less than 10 years

And

B. Baptism / Confirmation Certificate

(Check Annexure IV of the Bulletin for the suggested format for the certificate)



1. Selection of candidates under the sponsored category will be on the basis of merit of candidates certified by each body. Members of the Association and Council who are eligible to certify **SHALL CERTIFY ALL ELIGIBLE** candidates. It is essential that efforts be made by all certifying agencies to certify students belonging to the weaker and under privileged sections of society.

Normally certification should be offered to candidates belonging to the Christian faith if they and their families have had a meaningful relation with the Church or the related agency for a period of at least 10 years. In the case of transfer from one parish/ diocese/ another denomination to another, the total period of relationship with the Churches (regardless of area or denomination) should be taken into consideration.

2. Certification entails an agreement between the candidate and the certifying body whereby the candidate agrees to serve in one of the institutions of the body for a minimum period of two years. In the event of the certifying body being unable to utilise the services of the candidate, the candidate will be posted by the Christian Medical College, Vellore to another area of need.

3. All candidates who are selected for any educational course in the College shall execute with their certifying agency and/or the College legally valid agreements on appropriate stamp paper within 2 weeks of their selection. The College will get the students to execute the agreement written on behalf of the certifying agencies. Failure to execute the agreement will result in the candidate forfeiting the seat. The sample agreement is available on the website or can be obtained from the registrar's office at request.

4. No candidate shall pay any amount exceeding Rs. 250 to the certifying body towards registration for certification. Collection of any amount in excess of Rs.250 as donation/ security deposit/retainer or in any other form by the certifying body is a violation of the CMCV council resolutions and guidelines.

5. Indian certifying agencies may only certify Indian nationals.

6. Admission is restricted under the sponsored category to only one candidate from the same family (siblings) in any particular year to any single course offered by the Christian Medical College.

7. Service obligation should be discharged **only in terms of service and not through financial compensation**. Details of the service obligation are given separately for each course. Candidates and their parent/legal guardian are required to sign a service obligation agreement.

8. In the event a student fails to fulfil the service obligation by appropriate service as stated in the agreement, he/she will not be eligible for

- a) admission to any further educational courses at the Christian Medical College, Vellore, and
- b) Any appointments in the Christian Medical College and associated teaching hospitals.

9. The transcript and other college documents will be released only after the service obligation is fulfilled.

10. The list of certifying bodies eligible to sponsor candidates to the various courses is given in Annexure I of the Bulletin for summer admissions 2007. **THE OFFICE OF THE REGISTRAR WILL NOT CORRESPOND IN THIS REGARD WITH THE CANDIDATE.**



SERVICE OBLIGATION

CMC upholds the value that all its alumni will commit themselves to the service of the poor and marginalised. Annexure III

INFORMATION ON WRITTEN TESTS

What kind of examination will it be?

The admission tests are all in English and of the 'objective' or multiple choice answer type (see examples at the end). There will be many questions printed in the test booklet. Each question will have five possible answers printed after it. Your task will be to select the one best answer to each question. There will be ONLY ONE CORRECT ANSWER to each question. For the degree courses (MBBS, BSc – N & MLT, BOT & BPT) there are 60 questions each in Physics, Chemistry and Biology (120 mins total) and 120 questions in General Ability including Speed and Accuracy and a few questions on issues of current topical interest(70 mins). The whole exam is 3 hrs 10 mins. long.

For the Diploma courses, the examination consists of 25 questions each in Physics, Chemistry, Biology and General Ability.

For the BMRSc and other subjects where a background in science is not required, the non-science paper, (NS as it is often referred to) will have 100 questions including English, General Ability, speed and accuracy and a few questions on issues of current topical interest.

How should I write my answer?

In the examination hall, at each session, you will be given a test booklet and an answer sheet.

In the booklet, the choice of answers to each question will be listed alphabetically (after each question five suggested answers will be given) and these choices will be indicated as A,B,C,D,E. In the answer sheet, the serial numbers of each question will be printed and against each number, there will be oval boxes provided for you to shade the correct answer

Remember that you should shade only one answer for each question. If you shade more than one answer for any question, you will not be given any credit for it even if one of your answers is correct. If you want to change your answer, be sure to erase your wrong answer completely with an eraser and shade the correct oval box.

Should I write my name on the answer sheet?

You must write your hall ticket number, your name and sign in the area provided

You will be DISQUALIFIED if you write your name or anything else, which reveals your identity in any other part of the answer sheet.

How fast should I work?

Although most of the tests stress accuracy more than speed, it is important for you to use your time as economically as possible. Work steadily and as fast as you can, but with care.

Do not worry if you cannot answer all the questions. No one is expected to know the answers to all the questions. Do not waste time on questions that are too difficult for you but go on to the other questions and come back to the difficult ones later.

When the time allotted for a test is over, your Supervisor will instruct all the candidates to go on to the next test. Even if you have not yet finished that section of the test, go to the next test IMMEDIATELY or you may lose marks.

Should I Guess? Is there negative marking?

Since the possible answers for each question are provided, you may wonder whether or not to guess the answer for questions you are not certain about. There is no negative marking and hence at times it may be worthwhile making an intelligent guess. That choice is yours and you have to decide how close to the options you are.

In the degree (MBBS, etc) combined entrance examination only, credit is given for questions not attempted (those left blank). The credit given is equal to 1/5 (0.2) of the mark for that question. So your score will probably be more if you leave out the questions about which you know nothing. Remember, however, that a correct answer will be



given one full mark. So, if you have some knowledge of the question and are able to eliminate one or more of the possible answers, your chances of guessing the correct answer increase. It may be to your advantage to attempt such questions.

How should I prepare for these tests?

These tests have been designed to measure your knowledge, understanding and ability and not just your memory. It will help to review your science course carefully, making sure that you UNDERSTAND each subject thoroughly. Familiarise yourself with the model questions given below.

What is the syllabus?

The syllabus for the common entrance tests (unless otherwise specified) will be a mixture of 'plus two' level boards recognised by the TN Dr MGR Med University. Papers will be in Physics, Chemistry, Biology and General Ability including Speed and Accuracy and a few questions on current topical interest. Wherever there is a special paper, the syllabus would be based on the qualifying examination required for the subject. Please see the course description in the prospectus/ website.

What will I need at the examination?

You should have your Hall Ticket bearing your roll number with you. Take with you one or two HB pencils and an eraser since you will need a pencil to shade the correct answer on the answer sheet and if you make a mistake, you will need an eraser to erase the mistake.

This is all that you will need for the examination. You will NOT be permitted to take rough paper, scales, calculators, slide rule, logarithm tables, drawing instruments, or CELLULAR PHONES into the examination hall, as they are NOT needed. You need not memorise these directions since the most important ones will be repeated in the examination hall.

Some sample questions from each of the various tests are given below. These cover most of the types of questions that will be asked. There may, however, be some other varieties also. You will be given instructions and examples for each type of question when you start a new section on the question booklet. So take time to read the instructions carefully and go over the examples.

You will have approximately half-a-minute to answer each question. Check your answers with the correct answers given at the end of these pages. You may also use the specimen answer paper at the back to practice.

How are selections made?

Soon after the examination, dummy numbers are assigned to each answer paper and all further corrections and computations are done anonymously. After correction, the marks are converted to stanine grades and a final grade is worked out. Selection to the interviews is done purely on the basis of inter-se merit. The interviews and other tests focus on evaluating the person and his/her aptitude for the course.


